




Jesus and what he gives...

By entering into the asylum Jesus is revealing the deep desire of God to bridge the gap that separates people, to bring together, in unity and harmony, people who are different: the foolish, the wise, the powerful and the powerless.


Jesus sees him


Jesus says "Do you want to be healed?"

the sick man responds

"a man I do not have"





But he has no one to help him. His cry is a cry of loneliness.

Jesus is so moved by the despair and the powers of death in this man that he says: "Rise up and take up your mat and walk!" v. 8

It is as if Jesus cannot contain himself; he loves this man as he is, just as he loved the Samaritan woman. He yearns to liberate him from all the powers of despair within him, that he be fully alive.

In this story Jesus is not responding to a man's cry of faith, "Heal me!" but to his cry of despair, the cry of humanity in despair! Jesus is responding also to a pain within his own heart: the pain of seeing the loneliness and despair of this paralyzed man. Nobody wanted to see this man, but Jesus sees him.

Nobody loves him, but Jesus loves him.




