3. Attend to the Shape of Living

The issue at stake is the whole shape of living. To attend to that when we are overwhelmed is no easy matter. But it is hard to imagine any adequate way of coping that does not try to answer the big questions about life, death, purpose, good, and evil. So the basic conviction of this book is that we need to attend to the shape of living. We do not need to drown in what overwhelms us, nor in the solution to fiddle with some of the details, important though they are. While doing justice to both overwhelmings and the details, the main task is to stretch our minds, hearts, and the imagination in trying to find and invent shapes of living. It is a task as old as the flood and as modern as the computer.



The climax of the church year is Easter, when the final drama of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus is celebrated. But that drama is also at the heart of the Lord's Supper, Holy Communion or Eucharist. So whenever we celebrate the Eucharist we identify with the drama afresh and see our lives in its light. To do this week after week, year after year, can transform our sense of time past, present, and future.
