

November 1 Questions to Consider

1. Who are the people that come to mind when you hear the word NEIGHBOUR? How well do you know their stories? What stories do you encounter most regularly?
2. What is your vision for our neighbourhood called Saskatoon? What kind of a vision for the city best connects people, offers people a place to call home, looks out for the common good of all people, generates opportunity for business, and addresses the needs for the future? How would you go about taking steps to make it a reality?
3. What types of poverty (economic/relational/spiritual/emotional) are you aware of in your personal neighbourhood? In Saskatoon at a more broad level? How would you describe them?
4. What would you identify as systemic forces (“levels of power”) in our neighbourhoods or in our city that contribute to ongoing poverty? In what places do you feel you need to be better educated? In what places might you be able to offer some insight to others? In the context of *the connection*, are there specific places we should be partnering or inviting collaboration to better address the needs of our neighbours?
5. Who are some people that you individually (or we as a church) could be more intentional about proactively caring for? What ideas do you have for breaking down barriers that push people to the margins?
